# **LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD**

Oklahoma senators and representatives started the 2024 legislative session with more than 3,000 bills to be considered. Included in that legislation were ten proposals identified by The Petroleum Alliance Legislative Committee as "priority" bills for the oil and gas industry and are the benchmarks used to determine how state elected officials have supported the state's defining industry. Legislation used to determine each lawmaker's scoring is listed below.

### **ALLIANCE PRIORITY LEGISLATION**

**SB1505** — Expands the provisions of the Oklahoma Emission Reduction Technology Incentive Act, increasing the funding dedicated to it and designating rebate amounts for industry segments. When approved two years ago, the incentive act allowed for \$10 million per year for implementing qualified emission reduction projects, with the Department of Environmental Quality approving all claims for a rebate payment.

**SB1125** — The general appropriations bill for state agencies that includes the \$50 million for the Oklahoma Emission Reduction Technology Incentive Act.

**HB2197** — As a result of a court-mandated change in the way the Oklahoma Water Resources Board processes water permits, The Alliance negotiated a solution to protect the ability of oil and gas operators to access groundwater and stream water for drilling and completion operations. The legislation amends the definition of "provisional temporary permit" so the executive director of the OWRB may issue a 90-day permit for stream water and groundwater. The provisional permit may be renewed up to three times for the oil and gas industry.

**SB1514** — Takes the current five-year statute of limitations under the Production Revenue Standards Act and applies the time limit to the Commissioners of the Land Office as well.

**SB519** — Requires the CLO to hold an additional hearing on a proposed rulemaking action prior to promulgating a proposed rule. The commissioners must also notify all current lessees leasing land or minerals from the state not less than 30 days prior to the hearing date

HB4095 — A bill to further industry's efforts to enhance safety and damage prevention for Oklahoma's underground facilities, the legislation provides the operator of the underground facility a way to notify the excavator that the operator wants someone on-site during excavation; provides excavators a way to notify all operators with underground facilities in a dig-site area of the need for a pre-excavation meeting; and defines what qualifies as a large project for purposes of requesting a pre-excavation meeting.

**HB2367** — Creates exceptions to the Open Meeting Act for members of the Corporation Commission to discuss certain matters outside of a public meeting.

**HB3051** — Allows unused clean-burning motor vehicle fuel property tax credits to be redistributed among categories if one or more of the categories do not exhaust all of the allowable credits for the year. Prior law capped the credit amount at \$10 million each for natural gas, hydrogen, and public access electric charging stations.

**SB2025** — Allows oil and gas producers to make an election to report and pay the gross production tax on any oil that is retained by the producer and not sold at the time of production. When that oil is eventually sold,

the purchaser of any oil transferred off a lease will not be liable for the production tax and will not be required to obtain a purchaser's reporting number for the oil.

**HB3053** — Directs the Corporation Commission to evaluate the regulatory relationship between the state and the Southwest Power Pool.

### **BILLS VETOED BY GOV. STITT**

House Bill 3194— Would have required commercial groundwater users to install and maintain meters on all water wells. The bill had advanced to Stitt's desk even though stakeholders in the issue, including The Alliance, had been assured the bill was a work in progress and would be sent to conference committee for further discussion. But when the bill was heard on the Senate floor, Sen. Brent Howard, R-Altus, the bill's author, told his fellow lawmakers all stakeholders had given consent to the legislation as written. The bill was approved by the Senate and sent to the governor, forcing The Alliance to intervene and ask for a veto.

### **BILLS APPROVED IN COMMITTEE**

These bills were approved in committee but not heard on the House or Senate floor. They are included in the scoring criteria for the legislative scorecard.

**HB2950** — Would have provided a 0.25 percent personal income tax cut for all tax brackets and established a \$1 per megawatt-hour tax on electricity produced by renewable power to offset the income tax cut. The legislation advanced out of committee, but died after not being heard on the House floor.

### **BILLS STOPPED BY THE ALLIANCE**

These bills were stopped by The Petroleum Alliance before any votes were taken. Because they were not heard, they are not included in the scoring criteria for the legislative scorecard.

**HB2964** — Would have modified provisions regarding the scope and scale of trespassing. The bill, in short, would have required a two-day notice to landowners if oil and gas operations required access to private land.

**SB1389** — Proposed the creation of the Greenhouse Gas Cap and Invest Program under the management of the Corporation Commission.

**SB1553** — Would have put into state law that it is the legislature's intent to promote the development of renewable energy resources and related infrastructure.

**SB1555** — Would allow surface owners to sue oil and gas lease operators for triple the amount of the actual damages if a lease operator does not comply with Corporation Commission rules.

# **LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD**

This scorecard was created for Petroleum Alliance members and supporters to see how lawmakers and the legislature overall measure up on energy industry issues. Each legislator's 2024 Score is representative of how they voted on the legislation listed on the previous page. Their Lifetime Score is an average of their score since 2022 and will be updated each year the legislator is in office.

The six senators and one representative with 100 lifetime score are first-term lawmakers who have just completed their first two years in office.

This scorecard is for informational purposes and does not reflect an endorsement of legislators who scored well or a rejection of those with low scores. Senate and House votes and the ultimate outcome of legislation reveal where the legislature stands on issues that affect Oklahoma's defining industry.

**METHODOLOGY** — Bills used to determine these scores – SB519, SB1505, SB1514, SB2025, HB2197, HB2367, HB3051, HB2950, HB3053, and HB4095 The last floor vote was used to determine the legislator's position. All legislators start at 100 percent and each vote against The Petroleum Alliance of Oklahoma position results in 14 points being deducted. A missed vote will result in a loss of three points. A missed vote for a legislator taking constitutional privilege will not result in the loss of any points. If a legislator missed more than half of the votes, they will not receive a score.
