I'm proud to share that 2025 has been another highly successful year for The Petroleum Alliance at the Oklahoma Capitol. Thanks to the collective efforts of our members, staff, and lobbying team, we secured major policy wins that strengthen our industry and protect its future.



One of our top priorities this year was advancing the role of natural gas as Oklahoma's preferred fuel for electricity generation. Through key legislative initiatives, we helped reaffirm natural gas as a reliable, affordable, and abundant energy source—ensuring it remains central to the

state's long-term power strategy.

We also championed policies that protect critical infrastructure development, reduce legal and regulatory burdens on operators, and support emissions reduction technologies. From safeguarding contractor liability protections to ensuring fair treatment in property and permitting processes, our work this session directly supports the sustainability and growth of our industry.

Beyond the state level, we have taken action in Washington, D.C. In March, The Alliance led a letter to our congressional delegation — signed by 74 Oklahoma lawmakers — opposing federal subsidies for intermittent renewables that disadvantage baseload power sources like natural gas. This effort emphasized our commitment to free markets, grid reliability, and fair treatment of energy producers.

As we celebrate this year's accomplishments, we must remain focused on the challenges ahead. We will continue advocating for policies that support industry growth, technological innovation, and environmental stewardship, all while ensuring that Oklahoma's oil and natural gas industry remains central to our state's energy future.

I urge every member of The Petroleum Alliance to stay engaged. Whether it's meeting with elected officials, contributing to advocacy campaigns, or supporting The Petroleum Alliance PAC, your involvement is critical to protecting and advancing our shared interests.

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# LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD

Oklahoma senators and representatives started the 2025 legislative session with more than 3,000 bills to be considered. Included in that legislation were eight proposals identified by The Petroleum Alliance Legislative Committee as “priority” bills for the oil and gas industry and are the benchmarks used to determine how state elected officials have supported the state’s defining industry. Legislation used to determine each lawmaker’s scoring is listed below.

## ALLIANCE PRIORITY LEGISLATION

**HB 2036** — Brings much-needed reform to Oklahoma’s eminent domain process. Under the current system, landowners’ attorneys are incentivized to delay proceedings and push cases to jury trials, needlessly increasing costs, prolonging infrastructure development, and frustrating efforts to secure fair, timely outcomes. HB 2036 levels the playing field by discouraging unnecessary litigation and streamlining the process. It ensures property owners are treated fairly while curbing the excessive legal fees that can stall essential projects, including those critical to Oklahoma’s oil and natural gas industry..

**SB 335** — Prohibits rate-regulated utilities from offering ratepayer-funded incentives to promote switching from natural gas to electricity or other fuels.

**SB 642** — In a decision handed down in May 2024, the Oklahoma Supreme Court increased the liability of many businesses sued in cases involving subcontractors, including many oil and gas companies. Under the court’s ruling in *Knox v. Oklahoma Gas and Electric Co.*, a business cannot avoid liability if an employee of a subcontractor is injured on the job and collects workers’ compensation benefits, even in cases where contracts contain an indemnity clause to protect companies from acts of negligence. Under Senate Bill 642, the workers’ compensation statute’s exclusive remedy provision will not prohibit general contractors from enforcing indemnity contracts they’ve entered into with subcontractors.

**HB 1031** — Extends the sunset year for the Oklahoma Energy Resources Board through 2030, ensuring continued support for education and environmental restoration programs.

**SB 460** — Reinstates the natural gas energy standard, reaffirming Oklahoma’s commitment to natural gas as the state’s preferred fuel source for all new energy generation facilities and any added capacity to existing generation facilities.

**SB 469** — Requires all applications for rebates through the Oklahoma Emission Reduction Technology Rebate Program to be submitted to the Department of Environmental Quality by January 1, 2027. The measure also allows an applicant to submit an application to the DEQ

for preliminary review. The rebate program was created in 2023 at the request of The Alliance to help the oil and gas industry reduce methane emissions and was funded with \$50 million in 2024.

**SB 480** — This legislation is the “behind-the-meter” bill supported by Gov. Kevin Stitt during his “State of the State” address to open the legislative session. The legislation provides that entities or individuals generating electricity solely for their premises for their own consumption shall not be classified as a public utility. The measure requires any project related to behind-the-meter generation to include a natural gas component.

**HB 1372** — Grants a 50 percent discount on gross production taxes due for the first 36 months of production from wells on the Oklahoma Corporation Commission’s orphaned well list. A producer overseeing a recovery project for an orphaned well must file a \$25,000 security interest for each recovered well with the Secretary of State, which will be held in interest for the OCC’s well plugging fund.

## ALLIANCE LETTER TO OKLAHOMA CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION

In March, 74 Oklahoma lawmakers joined The Alliance in a letter to the state’s members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, outlining concerns with the clean electricity production tax credit and clean electricity investment tax credit. Those two subsidies included in President Biden’s Inflation Reduction Act are currently being deliberated during Congress’ reconciliation process, a special legislative process that allows federal lawmakers to quickly adjust taxes, spending, and debt limits.

“President Trump has made clear his commitment to unleash American energy,” the letter said. “A key step in achieving this free-market goal is ending the propping up of intermittent renewables for power generation at the expense of reliable baseload power from natural gas. While the oil and natural gas industry operates in a highly competitive and capital-intensive environment, wind and solar continue to receive federal handouts that mask their true costs and place undue strain on our electric grid.”

# **LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD**

This scorecard was created for Petroleum Alliance members and supporters to see how lawmakers and the legislature overall measure up on energy industry issues. Each legislator's 2025 Score is representative of how they voted on the legislation listed on the previous page. Their Lifetime Score is an average of their score since 2022 and will be updated each year the legislator is in office.

The three senators and six representatives with 100 lifetime score are first-term lawmakers who have just completed their first two years in office.

This scorecard is for informational purposes and does not reflect an endorsement of legislators who scored well or a rejection of those with low scores. Senate and House votes and the ultimate outcome of legislation reveal where the legislature stands on issues that affect Oklahoma's defining industry.

**METHODOLOGY** — Bills used to determine these scores – HB 1031, HB 1372, HB 2036, SB 335, SB 460, SB 469, SB 480, SB 642, and the Alliance letter to Congress. The last floor vote and inclusion in the letter were used to determine the legislator's position. All legislators start at 100 percent and each vote against The Petroleum Alliance of Oklahoma position results in 11 points being deducted. A missed vote will result in a loss of four points. A missed vote for a legislator taking constitutional privilege will not result in the loss of any points. If a legislator missed more than half of the votes, they will not receive a score.

# **ADVOCACY IN ACTION**

The most important weapon in our arsenal has been our organization's willingness to support our political allies through the organization's Wildcatters Club and the Petroleum Alliance PAC.

The oil and natural gas industry is always a potential target for punitive legislation and regulation. The Wildcatters Club is a key reason The Petroleum Alliance has been able to not only deflect negative legislation, but also to be proactive in pushing for laws that strengthen our state's oil and natural gas industry.

With your contribution you can assist in the election of officials who help pass or defeat legislation and influence regulations that affect your business every day. The Wildcatters Club needs your contribution in order to be an even more effective advocate for members of The Petroleum Alliance and the oil and natural gas industry as a whole.

## **Wildcatters Club Contribution Levels**

### **Inner Circle - \$5,000/year**

The Wildcatter Inner Circle is the most exclusive and important industry group in Oklahoma and is made up of CEOs, company leaders, and company owners. Membership is reserved for individuals and companies who are committed to maintaining the oil and natural gas industry's predominant place in the Oklahoma political arena.

### **Council - \$2,500/year**

The Wildcatter Council is the second tier of support designed to introduce young executives and new company owners to the importance of political advocacy.

### **Black Gold-\$1,000/year**

Black Gold Wildcatter membership is ideal for mid-level managers and veteran oilfield professionals who have staked their livelihood on Oklahoma's oil and natural gas industry.

### **Wildcatter - \$500/year**

The basic Wildcatter membership is designed to provide entry-level oil and natural gas industry professionals the opportunity to participate in The Alliance's political efforts.

### **Prospector - \$250/year**

Reserved for members of the Alliance's Future Leaders program, the Prospector level gives young professionals under 35 the opportunity to participate in the organization's political efforts.
