FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Petroleum Alliance of Oklahoma delivered another highly successful legislative session at the State Capitol, securing meaningful victories that will provide lasting benefits for Oklahoma's oil and natural gas producers.



This session, the Alliance led the charge on two critical issues that will return millions of dollars to the industry each year and strengthen Oklahoma's position as a competitive energy-producing state.

First, lawmakers approved historic reform of the Production Revenue Standards Act (PRSA), a long-standing priority for

The Petroleum Alliance and our members. These reforms will cut PRSA-related expenses for Oklahoma producers by nearly half, reducing unnecessary costs and helping operators reinvest more capital back into exploration, production, and job creation across the state.

Second, the Legislature passed important clarifying language ensuring that flowlines and gathering lines are not subject to ad valorem taxation. This measure provides certainty for producers and midstream operators while preventing burdensome tax treatment that could have negatively impacted energy development throughout Oklahoma.

Together, these achievements represent a major win for the industry and demonstrate the effectiveness of sustained advocacy and member engagement at the Capitol.

These successes did not happen overnight. They build upon the momentum created through years of strategic legislative victories and the continued involvement of Petroleum Alliance members who consistently engage in the political process, support industry advocacy efforts, and make their voices heard with elected officials.

The Petroleum Alliance remains committed to advancing policies that protect Oklahoma's oil and natural gas industry, promote economic growth, and preserve the state's energy leadership for generations to come.

We thank our members, legislative champions, and industry partners whose continued support made these accomplishments possible.

LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD

Oklahoma senators and representatives started the 2026 legislative session with more than 3,000 bills to be considered. Included in that legislation were seven proposals identified by The Petroleum Alliance Legislative Committee as “priority” bills for the oil and gas industry and are the benchmarks used to determine how state elected officials have supported the state’s defining industry. Legislation used to determine each lawmaker’s scoring is listed below.

ALLIANCE PRIORITY LEGISLATION

House Bill 1371 — A landmark agreement between mineral owners and the oil and gas industry paved the way for historic reforms of the Production Revenue Standards Act (PRSA). The legislation delivers meaningful cost savings and reduced liability for oil and natural gas producers.

Petroleum Alliance member company estimates indicate PRSA-related expenses will be reduced by approximately half of what producers currently spend each year. Those savings can be reinvested into Oklahoma operations, new development, and job creation.

Senate Bill 227 — Affirms that flowlines and gathering lines for both natural gas and produced water going from the wellhead to the first sales meter that is the point of custody transfer or to the boundary of the production are “necessary for production” and are therefore exempt from local ad valorem taxation.

Under Oklahoma’s long-standing tax framework, producers pay a gross production tax in lieu of local property taxes on production equipment. However, ambiguity in how “necessary for production” was defined had opened the door for some county assessors, through third-party consultants, to levy additional ad valorem taxes, effectively creating a form of double taxation. The legislation restores the original intent of the GPT system — ensuring producers are taxed once, not twice.

Senate Joint Resolution 49 — Repealed an Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission permanent rule that required oil and natural gas producers operating on OWCC lands to post an additional \$50,000 surety bond with the Commission. The now-repealed requirement created unnecessary double bonding because operators are already required to maintain surety bonds through the Oklahoma Corporation Commission.

Senate Bill 1439 — The “Energy Security and Independence Act” protects Oklahoma oil and natural gas producers, manufacturers, sellers, and related trade associations from climate-related lawsuits. The legislation prohibits courts in Oklahoma from hearing “covered civil liability actions” that seek damages or other relief tied to

climate change, greenhouse gas emissions, or the alleged effects of fossil fuel products when those products are functioning as intended.

House Bill 4429 — Establishes new disclosure requirements for proxy advisory firms that provide voting recommendations to shareholders and institutional investors. If a recommendation is based on non-financial considerations — such as environmental, social, or governance (ESG) policies — the advisor must notify shareholders and the company’s board and publicly state that the recommendation was not derived from a financial analysis.

House Bill 3986 — Updates Oklahoma’s gross production tax exemption for oil and gas wells completed using recycled water by removing previous date restrictions on which wells qualify.

House Bill 3465 — Extends the sunset date for the Oklahoma Emission Reduction Technology Rebate Program from July 1, 2027, to July 1, 2029.

ALLIANCE LETTER TO OKLAHOMA LAWMAKERS

The Petroleum Alliance of Oklahoma made clear this session that restoring Oklahoma’s competitiveness in the oil and natural gas industry would require meaningful legislative action. In a Feb. 17 letter to legislative leaders, Alliance President Brook A. Simmons warned that years of unfavorable policy decisions had contributed to the loss of capital investment and headquarters jobs to Texas and other states.

The letter argued that legislative actions between 2015 and 2018, including tax increases and regulatory changes, reduced Oklahoma’s competitiveness and shifted drilling activity elsewhere.

To reverse that trend, The Alliance called on lawmakers to pursue an aggressive pro-growth agenda focused on encouraging investment, rewarding innovation, and strengthening Oklahoma’s position as a leading energy state. That advocacy effort became a driving force behind several key Alliance-backed reforms this session, including PRSA reform and ad valorem tax relief related to flowlines and gathering lines.

LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD

This scorecard was created for Petroleum Alliance members and supporters to see how lawmakers and the legislature overall measure up on energy industry issues. Each legislator's 2026 Score is representative of how they voted on the legislation listed on the previous page. Their Lifetime Score is an average of their score since 2022 and will be updated each year the legislator is in office.

This scorecard is for informational purposes and does not reflect an endorsement of legislators who scored well or a rejection of those with low scores. Senate and House votes and the ultimate outcome of legislation reveal where the legislature stands on issues that affect Oklahoma's defining industry.

METHODOLOGY — Bills used to determine these scores - SB 227, HB 1371, SJR 49, SB 1439, HB 4429, HB 3986, and HB 3465. Due to their importance, scores for SB 227 and HB 1371 received double weighting in the scorecard calculations. The last floor vote and inclusion in the letter were used to determine the legislator's position. All legislators start at 100 percent and each vote against The Petroleum Alliance of Oklahoma position results in 11 points being deducted. A missed vote will result in a loss of three points. A missed vote for a legislator taking constitutional privilege will not result in the loss of any points. If a legislator missed more than half of the votes, they will not receive a score.
